Los angeles county recorder' s office birth certificates

To obtain a certified copy of a birth certificate of an infant 12 months or younger, contact the Vital Records Office of the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health in person or by mail. For birth certificates for all other persons, please contact the County Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk. Birth records available through the Los Angeles County Registrar-Recorder/ County Clerk include births that have occurred in the county since 1866, excluding those that occurred between 1972 and 1977. For a record of a birth that occurred between those years, contact the California Department of Public Health. Applying for a birth certificate means an application form, identification via a photo ID card and paying a monetary fee. You can look for a birth register to find out what time you were born, or where you were born, or who your biological parents are. Your official birth records can keep all this information. Unfortunately, they are not easy to find online. As convenient as it would be, there isn't a central directory of birth records that you can sift through to find your own birth record or to read through someone else's. But you are not without options if you have lost your birth certificate or if you are interested in showing someone else's birth record. There are different ways to see what time you were born, where you were born, etc. Not all birth records contain the same information; this varies both by country and state. For example, the time of birth can only be available on a long form birth certificate or can be excluded entirely on really old records or birth certificates belonging to someone born in a city with a relatively small population. The most reliable sources of birth registers are primary sources—i.e. the most reliable sources of birth. Birth certificates and records are material authenticated by government governmental and hospital organizations. How this works varies by state, so your best bet is to access your state's vital registry web page and walk away, or use the VitalChek website to request a copy of your birth certificate. If you're not in the United States, you might be able to search for birth records or family history information through official government websites, such as birth records in Australia or Library and Archives Canada. You can also use a free service that FamilyTreeNow.com. North Dakota Division of Vital Records. You can also do a general web search for <state> birth records" gov. such as California birth records" gov. From there you will find the official website for where you can request important items such as your birth information (e.g. like this page from the California Department of Public Health). Another website that can perform a broad search of public records for you is State Records. All you need is a name and place, but access to full birth records costs several dollars per month, otherwise, all you can see if the person is their current age and State records Results. The vital records of the archives are another example where you have to pay to view the birth documents. Your next best option is to use a website for access. If someone has included your information in a genealogy report, you may find information about birth records such as when and where you were born, who your relatives are, and maybe more. Some ancestry websites also have search options to look for birth records specifically. You can try FamilySearch's Historical Records or Findmypast, which is a genealogy service that can show someone's date of birth and public place; it works in the US, Ireland, Australia, New Zealand, UK, and other locations. Some state, county or church records are not online and likely never will be. For example, a church with baptismal records — which, depending on the time period you're interested in, may be the only available birth record — that stretches back 200 or 300 years, has little or no incentive to pay to digitize and surface these documents. Using clues from census records, old newspaper articles and related family histories can often get you in the right neighborhood. For example, if you were baptized and you know where, please contact the department and ask if you can search their records for your information. Or, if you have an idea of where you were born, you can contact the specific hospital and ask for the records department to dig up your information, provided you can provide them with enough personal information to prove that it really is your information you are looking for. If all else fails, some other offline sites to look for the time you were born (and other birth-related information) include baby books, birth messages (these are sometimes found in magazines as well), and Bibles. While it's a stretch if you don't have much information to start with, you might be lucky to find someone's date of birth, and possibly other details, from a cemetery. If you have no idea where to even start, a grave finder like BillionGraves is a good starting point and can even save you a trip to a physical burial site. Personal checks are accepted. Call or visit to verify current fees. Requests for vital items can take as long as 10-12 weeks. If you do not know or location of events, you can request a search in the State Vital Statistics office files and records. The fee for a search is \$3.00 per name for every ten years searched. Payment must be made in advance. After the search is complete, you will be informed if the record was located. Vital records in Ohio were not recorded by law until 1867. Although some records from some counties predate 1867, records of births, marriages and deaths in Ohio are generally not available for this date. An appointment is required to search the records. Tables identified in the indexes can be viewed and information can be copied from them, but the delivered copy of the vital record must be returned and is not allowed to leave the building. * For birth records from 1867 - December 29, 1908, please contact the Probate Court of the County where the birth occurred.
